Outcomes

- Reduction in crime and disorder problems that of greatest harm and concern to community
- Increased community safety, security and cohesion
- Increased support for people to cope with impact of victimisation; and
- Reduction in refunding amongst those already engaged in criminal and antisocial behaviour

Principles for good practice

Effective crime prevention involves:

- Strong & committed leadership
- Collaboration between multiple stakeholders
- Practical application of research & evaluation findings
- Focus on outcomes & a commitment to demonstrating measurable results
- Building & maintaining capacity
- Promoting an active & engaged community
- Long term commitment
- Coordination across sectors to embed crime prevention into relevant policies

Priority areas

- Concerted & coordinated response to address problems affecting communities across Australia
- Monitor local crime problems and develop priorities and targeted responses in individual jurisdictions
- Address new and emerging crime problems
- Improve evidence base for crime prevention
- Ongoing capacity building & technical assistance

Next phase

- Ensure Framework approaches, principles and priorities reflected in new and existing crime prevention strategies
- ANZCPSOG oversee implementation
- Priority areas subject to annual review
- Evaluate strategies implemented
- Long term review to determine effectiveness
