Foreword

In Australia, knowledge about juvenile offenders and offending is limited. Very little is known about the causes underlying juvenile engagement in crime. In addition, our knowledge about the characteristics and dynamics of juvenile offending is incomplete, so it comes as no surprise that attempts to tackle the problem have a high risk of failure. Juvenile corrections is an integral part of the juvenile justice system, and one that requires special attention because of the links that exist between juvenile delinquency and adult crime. For a majority of juvenile offenders, the correctional system is the final stage of a career of delinquency and/or crime. For society, it represents the last opportunity to rehabilitate those who probably are persistent juvenile offenders and whose adult lives may otherwise turn into a sequence of contacts with the criminal justice system.

The Australian Institute of Criminology has been compiling statistical data on persons held in juvenile corrective institutions, and reporting back to the relevant juvenile justice authorities on a quarterly basis, since 1981. The reports have detailed numbers of persons in juvenile corrective institutions and rates of juvenile incarceration for groups defined according to gender, age, Aboriginality and legal status. This is the first of a series of annual reports aimed at providing information on both long- and short-term trends so that relevant changes in the numbers and rates of juvenile incarceration in the States and Territories of Australia can be assessed.

Executive Summary

The overwhelming majority of young people have no contact with the criminal justice system, and of those who do have contact in the form of a court appearance, the majority has only the one appearance.

However, a sizeable minority of juveniles does have several court appearances leading to conviction although, of those convicted, only a relatively low number are sentenced to terms of imprisonment. This report reveals that 780 persons aged 10–17 years were held in a juvenile corrective institution on 30 June 1998—a rate of 37 per 100,000 relevant population, which was 3.8 times lower than the adult imprisonment rate on the same date (ABS 1999).

The major findings from this report are summarised as follows:

- On a national basis, the number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions per 100,000 relevant population declined during the period from 1981 to 1992. It increased in 1993 and seems to have stabilised around an average of 37 per 100,000 relevant population since 1994. The national rate has declined by an average 3.2 per cent a year over the whole 1981–98 period. Among males, rates have declined by an average 2.4 per cent a year, while among females rates have declined by an average 9.1 per cent a year.
- National rates mask differences among jurisdictions and are dominated by correctional data for New South Wales, which accounts for almost half of the total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions during any given year.
 The largest decreases in juvenile incarceration rates were observed for Victoria, where they declined by an average 8.7 per cent a year.
- Nationally, there are no significant quarterly variations in the rate of juvenile incarceration, although this result may not hold for jurisdictional data. An analysis of seasonality based on national data certainly results in cancellation of seasonal variations among the jurisdictions. Crime and court processes are known to be seasonal, so it seems reasonable to expect the number of juveniles under detention to follow some sort of seasonal pattern (Carcach & Leverett, forthcoming).
- Indigenous rates of juvenile incarceration have declined by an average
 1.7 per cent a quarter during the six years from 1993 to 1998, while
 non-Indigenous rates have remained stable over the same period. The rate

- of over-representation of Indigenous persons declined from 26.1 during the first quarter of 1993 to 18.5 during the fourth quarter of 1998, or an average of 1.5 per cent a quarter.
- Nationally, the number of persons held on remand, as a percentage of the total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions, has increased from 21.4 per cent in 1981 to 42.6 per cent in 1998. This result suggests that, while the number of juveniles coming through the correctional system has been declining over the years, either the time taken by the courts for their processing is increasing or there is a growing preference for the incarceration of offenders on remand. No differences are observable according to Indigenous status or gender.

Introduction

The Australian Institute of Criminology has published quarterly statistics on numbers and rates of juveniles in corrective institutions from the March guarter of 1981 until the June guarter of 1998, based on data provided by the juvenile justice authorities in the States and Territories. All persons held in juvenile corrective institutions during the last day of the relevant quarter are in scope for this collection. Given the differences among jurisdictions regarding the definition of a juvenile, statistics are published for people aged from 10 up to 18 years. However, in order to facilitate comparability among the figures for the States and Territories, emphasis is placed on information about people aged 10 to 17 years.

Starting with the year 1998, the
Australian Institute of Criminology will
publish statistics on persons in juvenile
corrective institutions on an annual
basis. Data will still be collected from
the relevant agencies for quarterly
periods, and statistics will be published
for the quarters of each year. The new
format will present the same
information formerly available from the
quarterly reports, and also provide

statistics on annual variations in the numbers and rates of juvenile incarceration, and on the legal status of those held in juvenile corrective institutions. In addition, the new format will include time series data, both unadjusted and seasonally adjusted, on total and Indigenous incarceration rates. It is expected that this will assist policy and decision making by the relevant juvenile justice authorities, and that it will promote discussion on processes leading to the improvement of statistics on juvenile incarceration.

Data for this publication have been derived from the quarterly reports published by the Australian Institute of Criminology from 1981 to 1997. Data for the year 1998 have been provided to the Australian Institute of Criminology by the following juvenile justice authorities in the States and Territories:

- New South Wales Department of Juvenile Justice
- Department of Human Services, Victoria
- Department of Families, Youth and Community Care, Queensland

- Ministry of Justice, Western Australia
- Department of Family and Community Services, South Australia
- Department of Health and Human Services, Tasmania
- Northern Territory Correctional Services
- Youth Justice Services, Australian Capital Territory

The data on which this report is based consist of the census muster taken by the relevant juvenile justice authorities in each State and Territory during the night of the last day of each quarter. The census provides the numbers of persons in juvenile corrective institutions according to gender, age, Indigenous status and legal status.

This report is organised in two parts. The first part discusses findings about trends in juvenile incarceration over the 18 years from 1981 to 1998. The second part contains a statistical review of the four quarters of 1998, aimed at satisfying specific informational requirements of juvenile justice authorities.

PART 1: TRENDS IN JUVENILE INCARCERATION, 1981–1998

Numbers of Persons in Juvenile Corrective Institutions and Rates of Juvenile Incarceration





Figure 1: AUSTRALIA, STATES & TERRITORIES, 1981–1998.

On a national basis, the number of persons aged 10–17 years in juvenile corrective institutions has shown a declining trend during the 18 years from 1981 to 1998, as has the rate of incarceration. The number of persons aged 10-17 years held in corrective institutions declined from 1,352 in June 1981 until June 1992, when it reached 577. This number increased during the following years and seems to have stabilised around an average 780 persons a year. Rates of incarceration follow a similar trend and seem to have stabilised around 37 persons aged 10-17 years per 100,000 relevant population (refer to Figure 1 and Table 1).

Jurisdictional Differences

As expected for a country like Australia with a federal system of government, and as shown by Table 1 and Figure 1, there have been jurisdictional differences in juvenile detention numbers and rates. The following comments focus on rates per 100,000 persons aged 10–17 years.

In New South Wales, and except for the years from 1981 to 1983, when the rate of incarceration for persons aged 10–17 years exceeded 80 per 100,000 population, the rate of juvenile detention has oscillated between a high of 59.6 during 1984 and a low of 38.2 during 1988. The rate seems to move in three-year cycles, when it varies between values around 38 to 52, and between 48 and 58 per 100,000 during more recent periods. The following cycles are identifiable from the data in Table 1: 1985-1987, 1988–1990, 1991–1993, 1994–1996 and 1997-1998.

In *Victoria*, the rate of juvenile incarceration declined steadily from 59.7 during June 1981 to 10.2 during June 1993. Since then, it has experienced a slight increase, and it seems to have stabilised around an average of 14 per 100,000 population aged 10–17 years (refer to Figure 1).

In *Queensland*, rates of juvenile detention declined steadily from June 1981 to June 1993. Starting from June 1994, this rate increased and has varied between 24.9 and 35.0 per 100,000 population aged 10–17 years. It should be noted that Queensland

experienced the lowest rates of incarceration in the country during the eighties. This was not the case during the nineties; in particular since 1995, when the rate of juvenile incarceration exceeded the level prevailing in 1981 (refer to Figure 1).

In Western Australia, juvenile incarceration rates have ranged between a high of 84.3 during June 1981 and a low of 40.5 during June 1988. Note that during the period from 1985 to 1994, Western Australia experienced the highest juvenile detention rates among the States. Overall, and after excluding the rates for 1981 and 1982, the rate of juvenile detention has oscillated widely and it is very difficult to identify a trend. However, the data in Table 1 and Figure 1 show that rates have varied according to three major periods. During the first period, rates increased from 49.0 in June 1984 to 63.0 in June 1990. During the second period, rates oscillated between 58.3 in June 1991 and 64.5 in June 1994. During the third period, rates increased from 49.4 during June 1995 to 62.6 during June 1998.

In South Australia, rates of juvenile detention declined during the eighties, from 41.4 during June 1981 to a low 18.2 during June 1989. The trend during the nineties has been upward, with two periods identifiable. The first, covering the years from 1990 to 1994, corresponded to an increase from 22.9

to 36.3 juveniles per 100,000 relevant population. The second period included the highest rate of juvenile incarceration in the State during the 18 years covered by this report. In June 1996, the rate reached a record 51.6, but since then it has declined to 30.9 in June 1998 (refer to Figure 1).

Tasmania experienced a decline in the rate of juvenile incarceration during the period from 1981 until 1995. Noticeably, the rate in this State remained below 20 per 100,000 during four of the five years from 1990 to 1995. Suddenly, in June 1996, the rate of juvenile incarceration reached values similar to those observed during the 1983-1985 period. Although it is too early to predict the future behaviour of the Tasmanian juvenile incarceration rate, the latest figures seem to suggest a downward trend. An important issue is whether the rate will ever recover the low values recorded during the early eighties (refer to Figure 1).

Juvenile incarceration rates in the Northern Territory have been among the highest in the country over the 18 years covered by this report, the main reason being the comparative youthfulness of the Territory's population. Note, however, that, as shown by the data in Table 1, the rate has tended to vary widely over the period considered here. During the eighties, the rate of juvenile incarceration increased from a low of

5.5 during June 1981 to a high of 208.6 per 100,000 population aged 10–17 years during June 1989. Since 1990, the tendency has been to lower imprisonment rates until 1997, when it recovered its upward trend. The rate of juvenile incarceration during June 1998 (103.5 per 100,000 population 10–17 years of age) was almost double that observed during the same month in 1996, which no doubt is the direct result of the three-strike legislation introduced by the Territory's government in 1997 (refer to Figure 1).

Rates of juvenile incarceration in the *Australian Capital Territory* have experienced a downward trend over the 18 years between June 1981 and June 1998. Note, however, that the rate has fluctuated widely around an overall mean level of 34.2 per 100,000 population 10–17 years of age (see Table 1 and Figure 1).

100,000 Relevant Population



Temporal Variations in Juvenile Incarceration

Juvenile justice authorities provide the Australian Institute of Criminology with data on persons held in juvenile corrective institutions on a quarterly basis. It is thus possible that published statistics on juvenile incarceration may reflect seasonal variations. Numbers

and rates may vary from one quarter to the next in a systematic fashion as a consequence of variations in juvenile offending or in the processing of juvenile offenders by police and the relevant courts. Seasonally adjusted figures are expected to provide a more


accurate picture of the temporal behaviour of juvenile incarceration. Table 2 and Figure 2 contain unadjusted and seasonally adjusted national rates of juvenile incarceration.

As shown by the data in Table 2, and more clearly by Figure 2, nationally, there are no significant quarterly variations in the rate of juvenile incarceration. This suggests the absence of major seasonal movements in the series. In general, this result also holds for data from the five mainland States, with the exception of South Australia and Western Australia. In these two States,

juvenile incarceration rates tend to drop during the fourth quarter of the year.

Quarterly data mask the impact that court activity patterns may have on rates of juvenile incarceration. Monthly data would undoubtedly reveal systematic variations over the year. It seems reasonable to expect the rate of juvenile incarceration to decline during the December–February period, and to increase during the month of March. The rate for the quarter ending on 31 December reflects the cumulative effect of court decisions that are made during the months of

October and November, when crime rates for property crimes, which are predominantly committed by juveniles, tend to increase. On the other hand, the incarceration rate for the first quarter of the year combines the effect of court decisions that are made during the months from January to March. January is a month when property crime rates tend to increase, while February and March correspond to declining rates of property crime (Carcach & Leverett, forthcoming).

There is a lag between the time a juvenile is admitted to a corrective institution and the time when he or she committed an indictable offence.

Quarterly data, irrespective of the length of the time series that may be available, do not enable one to assess the magnitude of such a lag. This is due to the fact that most juvenile offenders are kept in corrective institutions for short periods of time, usually shorter than a quarter.

Gender Differentials

Males dominate the population of juveniles in corrective institutions.

Nationally, the contribution that females make to the total population has declined from 17.2 per cent during June 1981 to 6.3 per cent during June 1998. The data in Table 3 suggest that, nationally, during the nineties, the contribution of females to the total

population of juveniles under detention has stabilised around 6.5 per cent.

The data in Table 3 indicate the existence of interjurisdictional variations in female participation in juvenile incarceration. Figure 3 shows females as a percentage of the total population aged 10–17 years held in juvenile corrective institutions during










Figure 4: AUSTRALIA, STATES & TERRITORIES, 1981–1998.


Persons Aged 10–17 Years in Juvenile Corrective

to Female Rates of Incarceration




















the period from 1981 to 1998, and for each jurisdiction.

The graphs in Figure 3 show that, as expected, the national downward trend in the proportion of female detainees reflects trends in the three major jurisdictions, namely New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland. In Western Australia and South Australia, female participation in juvenile imprisonment has remained relatively stable over the 18-year period under study. In the smaller jurisdictions (Tasmania, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory), the percentage of females in the total juvenile population under detention shows a downward trend, despite its relatively large variation around the national average.

The Ratio of Male to Female Incarceration Rates

As expected, the decline in the female contribution to the total number of juveniles under detention has resulted in an increasing ratio of male to female rates of juvenile incarceration. Figure 4 shows the ratios of male to female rates of incarceration for the States and Territories during the period 1981–1998, compared to the ratio for Australia. As shown by the graphs in Figure 4, the male-to-female incarceration ratio has tended to

increase during the period under investigation, in particular in New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland.

Crime statistics show that the number of females in the population of juveniles charged with an offence or dealt with by police has increased in recent years (Mukherjee et al.1997). The types of crime committed by female juvenile offenders tend to be of a less serious nature than those committed by their male counterparts, which in part may explain their reduced contribution to the incarcerated population. Reduced recidivism rates among females is another factor that may explain the disparities in incarceration rates of male and female juvenile offenders. For example, using data from a cohort of juvenile offenders appearing in New South Wales children's courts. Carcach and Leverett (1999) found recidivism rates of 38 per cent for males and 30 per cent for females. More importantly, while males took an average 17 months to record a further court appearance, females took 22 months.

The situation may be more complex than suggested by these facts. The data in Table 3 show that the percentage of females in the total juvenile population under detention declined sharply during the eighties, especially in Victoria. Whether this is an indication of reductions in female

juvenile offending or of changes in juvenile court decision processes regarding use of imprisonment for female juvenile offenders, or that the majority of female juvenile offenders began to commit less serious offences than male offenders, is an issue requiring further investigation.

Indigenous Status

A number of reports have found Indigenous Australians to have higher rates of contact with the criminal justice system than the rest of the population. One of the major recommendations of the Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody highlighted the need to monitor imprisonment of Indigenous persons.

Data on Indigenous persons held in juvenile corrective institutions have been collected since 1993. Table 4 and Figure 5 show unadjusted and seasonally adjusted national quarterly rates of juvenile incarceration, according to Indigenous status, for the period from 1993 to 1998.

The data in Table 4 and Figure 5 indicate that young Indigenous persons are much more likely to be held in a corrective institution than are their non-Indigenous counterparts.

On a national basis, the rate of incarceration among Indigenous juvenile offenders has declined from 538.2 per 100,000 relevant population, during the first quarter of 1993, to 358.4 per 100,000 relevant population, during the fourth quarter of 1998.

Non-Indigenous rates of juvenile

incarceration have oscillated around an average 23 per 100,000 relevant population during the period under study.

As indicated by the graphs in Figure 5, there is no evidence of significant seasonal variations in the rates of Indigenous and non-Indigenous juvenile incarceration, at least on a national basis.

The ratio of Indigenous to non-Indigenous rates of imprisonment has been traditionally used as a measure of the level of over-representation of Indigenous persons in the juvenile correctional system. Table 5 and Figure 6 show national over-representation ratios for Indigenous persons over the 24 quarters from 1993 to 1998.

The level of Indigenous overrepresentation in the population of persons in juvenile corrective institutions reached its highest value during the first two quarters of 1993. Since the third quarter of 1994, it has varied between 16 and 22.

In general, the data show a downward trend in the level of Indigenous over-representation

(see Figure 6). Note, however, that the values seem to vary from quarter to quarter and that the pattern of quarterly variation differs from year to year. During 1994 and 1997, the level of Indigenous over-representation

increased over the four quarters, while it showed the opposite trend during 1993 and 1995. During 1996 and 1998, the level of Indigenous overrepresentation has remained stable over the four quarters.



Indigenous Status








Legal Status of Persons in Juvenile Corrective Institutions


Persons in juvenile corrective institutions at any quarter are classified into two groups according to their legal status. One group consists of those juveniles who are awaiting court hearing, outcome or penalty (usually referred to as remanded) and the other group consists of sentenced detainees.

The number of persons on remand as a percentage of the total persons held

in juvenile corrective institutions has increased from 21.4 per cent during 1981 to 42.6 per cent during 1998.

These data suggest that, while the number of juveniles coming through the correctional system has been declining over the years, either the time taken for their processing by the courts is increasing, or the preference for incarceration of remanded offenders has increased, or both.

As shown by the data in Table 6, there is no difference between the changes in the remand proportions of males and females over the years. Note, however, that female juvenile offenders seem to be more likely than males to be placed on remand (53 per cent to 42 per cent in 1998).

Table 7 shows the distribution of persons in juvenile corrective

institutions according to Indigenous status. The percentage of persons in juvenile corrective institutions awaiting court hearing, outcome or penalty has oscillated between 30 and 40 over the 1993–1998 period. The data in Table 7 do not indicate any difference between the remand proportions of Indigenous and non-Indigenous persons (refer to Figure 8).





Data for 1998 were derived from statistics provided by the relevant juvenile justice authorities of each State and Territory.

PART 2: STATISTICAL REVIEW OF PERSONS IN JUVENILE CORRECTIVE INSTITUTIONS, 1997–1998

Summary by Jurisdiction

This part of the report contains statistics on persons in juvenile corrective institutions during each quarter of the year 1998, compared to 1997. A summary of the most important features of the data follows.

New South Wales

The total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions recorded during each quarter of 1998 was lower than the numbers for each quarter of 1997. With regard to persons aged 10–17 years, the number held in juvenile corrective institutions during the first two quarters of 1998 was less than the corresponding numbers during the same quarters in 1997. On the other hand, the third and fourth quarters of 1998 recorded an increase in the number of persons aged 10-17 years with respect to the same quarters in 1997. The number of persons aged 18 years and over held in juvenile corrective institutions during all the quarters of 1998 declined with respect to the corresponding quarters in 1997.

- The number of Indigenous persons held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during all the quarters of 1998. Note, however, that the number of female Indigenous persons aged 10–17 years increased during the third quarter of 1998.
- Rates of incarceration of Indigenous persons continued to decline during the four quarters of 1998. The only exception to this general trend was the rate for females, which during the third quarter of 1998 recorded a value of 113.8 per 100,000 population compared to 85.6 during the same quarter in 1997.
- The level of Indigenous overrepresentation declined during the four quarters of 1998. This was the result of reductions in the rate for Indigenous persons, coupled with slight increases to the rate for non-Indigenous persons. Note that the rate of incarceration among non-Indigenous persons increased during 1998, except for the first quarter.

 The percentage of remanded persons aged 10–17 years who were held in juvenile corrective institutions increased during 1998, except for the first quarter. Among females, there was a decline during the first and fourth quarters of 1998. Among female Indigenous persons, the percentage of remanded declined during all the quarters of 1998.

Victoria

- The total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions increased during 1998, with exception of the fourth quarter. With regard to persons aged 10-17 years, the number held in juvenile corrective institutions during the first two quarters of 1998 was less than the corresponding numbers during the same quarters in 1997. On the other hand, the third and fourth quarters of 1998 recorded increases in the number of persons aged 10-17 years with respect to the same quarters in 1997. The number of persons aged 18 years and over held in juvenile corrective institutions during all the quarters of 1998 experienced increases with respect to the corresponding quarters in 1997, with exception of the fourth quarter.
- The number of females aged 10–17 years increased during 1998,

- except for the second quarter. On the other hand, the number of males declined during 1998, except for the second quarter.
- The total rate of juvenile incarceration declined during the first two quarters and increased during the last two quarters of 1998. Male rates declined during the first third quarters, while female rates increased during the first and third quarter of 1998.
- The number of Indigenous persons held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during 1998, except for the second quarter.
- Except for the second quarter, rates
 of Indigenous incarceration
 declined during 1998, a trend that
 was dominated by the behaviour of
 the male rates. The second quarter
 of 1998 recorded a rate of 262.0,
 which was higher than the rate of
 202.5 recorded during the same
 quarter in 1997.
- The level of Indigenous overrepresentation declined during 1998, except during the second quarter. Indigenous rates followed a similar pattern, however non-Indigenous rates experienced slight increases during the last two quarters of 1998.
- The percentage of remanded persons aged 10–17 years who are held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during 1998,

except for the third quarter. Among females, there was a decline during the first quarter, but increases were observed during the second and third quarters.

Queensland

- With exception of the last quarter, the total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions increased during each quarter of 1998 with respect to the corresponding quarters of 1997. This trend was dominated by the figures for males aged 10–17 years.
- The total rate and the male rate of juvenile incarceration increased during 1998, except for the last quarter. Female rates declined during the first two quarters, but increased slightly during the third and fourth quarters of 1998.
- The number of Indigenous persons held in juvenile corrective institutions increased during 1998, except for the fourth quarter.
- Except for the fourth quarter, rates
 of Indigenous incarceration
 increased during 1998. This trend
 was dominated by the behaviour of
 male rates. The fourth quarter of
 1998 recorded a rate of 325.5,
 which was lower than the rate of
 454.2 recorded during the same
 quarter in 1997.

- The level of Indigenous overrepresentation declined during 1998, except during the third quarter. Indigenous rates increased during the first three quarters of 1998, while non-Indigenous rates experienced slight increases during the first two quarters of 1998.
- The percentage of remanded persons aged 10–17 years who are held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during 1998, except for the fourth quarter.
 Among females, there was a decline during the last quarter, but increases were observed during the other quarters.

Western Australia

- With exception of the third quarter, the total number of persons in juvenile corrective institutions increased during each quarter of 1998 with respect to the corresponding quarters of 1997. This trend was dominated by the figures for males aged 10–17 years.
- The rate of juvenile incarceration increased during 1998, except for the third quarter, with no differences between males and females.
- The number of Indigenous persons held in juvenile corrective institutions increased during the first two quarters and declined

- during the last two quarters of 1998.
- Except for the second quarter, rates
 of Indigenous incarceration
 declined during 1998. This trend
 was dominated by the behaviour of
 female rates. The second quarter of
 1998 recorded a rate of 758.8,
 which was higher than the rate of
 649.2 recorded during the same
 quarter in 1997.
- The level of Indigenous overrepresentation declined during 1998, mostly due to the slight increases observed in the non-Indigenous rate of incarceration during all quarters of 1998.
- The percentage of remanded persons aged 10–17 years who are held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during 1998, except for the second quarter. No sizeable differences are detectable in terms of gender or Indigenous status.

South Australia

 The number of persons held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during all the quarters of 1998. This trend was dominated by the changes in the group aged 10–17 years. The number of persons aged 18 years and over increased during 1998 with respect

- to 1997, except during the fourth quarter.
- With exception of the first quarter, the total number of Indigenous persons in juvenile corrective institutions increased during each quarter of 1998 with respect to the corresponding quarters of 1997.
 Variations in the numbers of juveniles under detention are, however, too small to be considered as significant.
- Rates of Indigenous incarceration declined during 1998. This trend was dominated by the behaviour of male rates. Female rates recorded increases during the second and fourth quarters.
- The level of Indigenous overrepresentation increased during 1998. This was due to proportionate declines in the rates of incarceration for both Indigenous persons and non-Indigenous persons.
- The percentage of remanded persons aged 10–17 years held in juvenile corrective institutions declined during the second and third quarters of 1998, but increased during the other two quarters.

Tasmania, Northern Territory and Australian Capital Territory

The numbers of juveniles under detention in each of these jurisdictions is too small to support any detailed analysis. Readers interested in detailed information about the situation of juvenile incarceration during 1998 are referred to the tables that follow these comments.






