## Additional comments:

The draft T&I is interesting to read and well written. However, as outlined below, the draft omits making reference to a number of key Australian articles of relevance. The author(s) should consider making reference to these articles, including the findings and comparative results.

## Further comments:

Page 2 – 'Despite ongoing debate around the efficacies of firearm control (see below for a summary of these), much of the academic literature has to date overlooked the phenomenon of mass shootings. – See the following articles which the author should consider referencing:

- Pages 3-4: 'The academic literature, particularly that from the US, is quite prolific, supplemented by assessments from Australia and Canada. These studies, however, have produced mixed, if not contradictory results (eg Altheimer & Boswell 2012).' See comment above. The review of previous literature omits three Australian studies.
- Page 4: 'The definition adopted here has the advantage of being conservative and includes cases that are not likely to be contested. At the same time, it could be said to significantly understate the problem.' This may be more an issue in relation to the United States given the incidence of overall homicide in comparison to Australia.
- Page 6-7: 'The US data do not permit establishing the nature of the relationship between the offender and the victims but a review of media reports attached to these incidents revealed there was familiarity between the offender and some of his/her victims in at least some of these cases.' This is an important limitation of the current study. If data were available on this variable, it would demonstrate a discernible difference between the types of mass homicides committed in the US in comparison to Australia.

Page 8: 'These facts raise questions about whether some of these mass shootings could have been averted if noticeable warning signs were (or could have been) acted upon by relatives, neighbours, teachers, co-workers, health professional and/or law enforcement.' – Any suggestions as to how this may be achieved from a prevention/ intervention perspective?
