

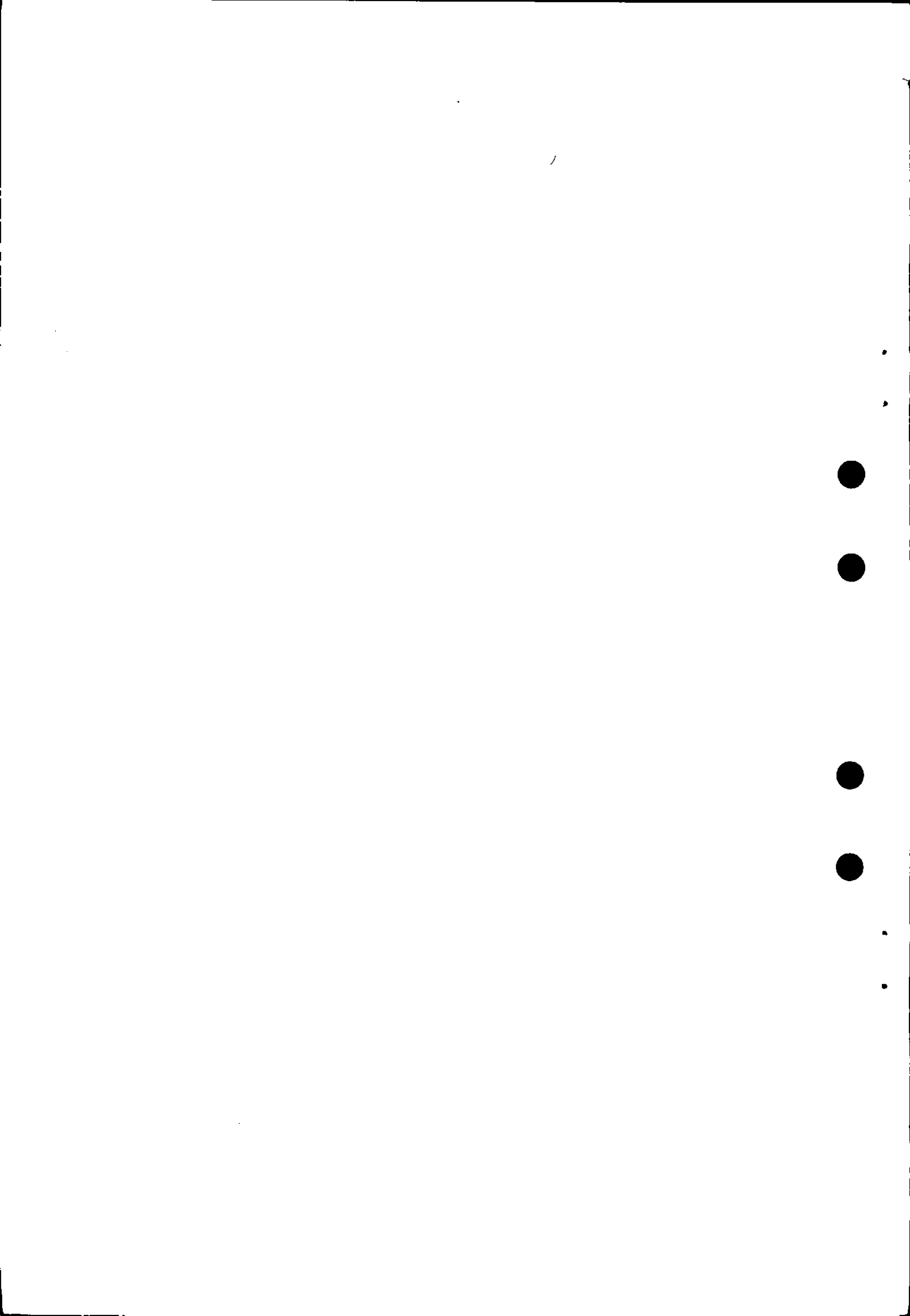

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INTRODUCTION

In an article in Chappell and Wilson's *The Australian Criminal Justice System*, A.G. Hess has pointed to the need for the establishment in Australia of a national clearinghouse, to function as a 'centralised information unit which serves as a source of data and/or information to research workers and practitioners in the field'.

The Australian Institute of Criminology has established such a clearinghouse and a great deal of information concerning Australian and Australian-related publications, completed and on-going research is being collected. This information is being computerised to enable an efficient criminological information retrieval system to be developed.

In the belief that duplication of research is undesirable, particularly in a field where manpower and funds are scarce, the Institute has decided to use this *Information Bulletin* as a means of disseminating information concerning Australian or Australian-related publications and research of criminological significance. Also included is information supplied by correspondents from each Australian State and the Northern Territory as to criminological seminars and meetings which take place in their respective jurisdictions. However, information from any source regarding matter to be included in the *Information Bulletin* would be welcomed and should be sent to the Editorial Committee.

The *Information Bulletin* is published quarterly and readers who would like a statement of their current or recently completed research to appear in the *Information Bulletin* are requested to detach from this issue the appropriate page, to complete it and return it to the address below.

Readers will appreciate that the clearinghouse information contained in the *Information Bulletin* is based largely on direct information supplied by individuals and departments and can only be as accurate and reliable as its source.

The Australian Institute of Criminology appreciates the response which it has already received in establishing the clearinghouse and it is hoped that the service it provides will assist the promotion of Australian research into criminological problems which urgently require attention.

Current evidence suggests that imprisonment is, if anything, less effective than non-institutional treatment in the prevention of recidivism. However, the research on which this conclusion is based contains serious methodological flaws. A quasi-experimental technique, not subject to these weaknesses, is developed here and applied to data on Connecticut offenders. Although subject to difficulties of their own, these data suggest that imprisonment is indeed less effective than its alternatives in preventing recidivism.

179 JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

Topic: Delinquency and Socio-Economic Status as Factors in Illiteracy of Male Juveniles

Outline: The study analysed the relationship of six demographic factors to illiteracy (defective spelling in spontaneous writing) among boys aged 13 to 15. With boys of low s.e.s. illiteracy had a highly significant association with delinquency rate of area of residence. The illiteracy of institutionalised delinquents was not higher than that of comparable (age, s.e.s.) school boys. No relationship was found between the s.e.s. of the boys' families and illiteracy, except in residential areas which combined an upper class s.e.s. with high delinquency rates. There were indications that lower class status of area of residence could be related to the illiteracy of boys from families of higher s.e.s. No differences were found among the illiteracy levels of individual schools, or the three age groups represented in the sample.

The findings were discussed critically and the conclusion drawn that the problem of illiteracy among early school leavers should be approached through social measures aiming at conditions which favour the culture of delinquency (high delinquency rates), rather than through educational and legalistic measures which aim to reform the individual.

180 PAROLE

Topic: Alexander Maconochie and the Development of Systems of Parole

Outline: Maconochie has enjoyed a far higher reputation as a penal reformer with penologists in America than with penologists in Australia or England. Among the achievements with which he is credited by the former is an important contribution to the development of the concept and practice of parole. Indeed, before the appearance of Barry's biography of Maconochie it had become their custom to refer to Maconochie as the originator of tickets-of-leave, between which and modern systems of parole there is a direct line of development. From Barry's biography they learned that tickets-of-leave were being granted to transported convicts long before Maconochie became seriously interested in penal reform in 1837. Nevertheless, if they can no longer see Maconochie as the 'father' of parole, they continue to see him as having had a considerable influence on the development of the theory and implementation of systems of parole.

This paper argues by reference to Maconochie's writings and to his administration of Norfolk Island, that to those elements in the penal system of his time from which modern systems of parole have developed, Maconochie was almost

totally opposed; and attempts to show thereby that the position that American penologists accord to Maconochie in the history of penal reform is based on a misunderstanding of his true views.
