INTRODUCTION

The Australian Institute of Criminology has established a national clearinghouse of criminological information to act as a central agency for the collection, storage, exchange and dissemination of bibliographical data on Australian and Australian-related criminological material.

This information is stored on computer and forms the data base of CINCH (Computerised Information from National Criminological Holdings), the Institute's computerised bibliographic service which provides rapid and comprehensive retrospective searches.

The *Information Bulletin of Australian Criminology* is published quarterly and is an integral part of this system, publishing in its 'Recent Publications' and 'Current and Recently Completed Research' sections all the new material which continuously updates the CINCH data base. It also contains information regarding past and forthcoming seminars in Australia, bibliographical activities of the J.V. Barry Memorial Library and generally aims to encourage a greater interchange of information between all persons interested in Australian criminology.

The success of the Information Bulletin depends to a large degree on material contributed to it by its readers, and persons who would like a statement of their research to appear or wish to publicise conferences or seminars are invited to complete the appropriate forms supplied with each issue and return them to the address below.

Readers will appreciate that the information contained in the Information Bulletin can only be as accurate and reliable as its source.

The Australian Institute of Criminology hopes that the services provided by CINCH and this Information Bulletin prove valuable to those interested in criminology and looks forward to the continued interest and assistance of its readers.

EDITORIAL

The commencement of this volume of the *Information Bulletin* is marked by an alteration of its name to the *Information Bulletin of Australian Criminology*. The Editorial Committee considers this title better indicates the nature and scope of the material contained in this publication. The numbering of volumes will continue from the previous *Information Bulletin*.

AN INTRODUCTION TO CINCH

CINCH (Computerised Information from National Criminological Holdings) is a computer-based bibliographical information system which provides or will provide a number of services relevant to Australian criminology including:

1. The quarterly *Information Bulletin of Australian Criminology* as a current awareness publication.
2. Retrospective searches of the literature by topic, author, or journal on request.
3. Publication of all or part of the data base together with various indexes to enable information retrieval without access to the computer.

The Data Base

The aim of the Australian Institute of Criminology is to compile a bibliography of Australian criminology, involving the collection of *citations* to Australian material rather than the *material* itself. 'Australian' in this context means information published (or unpublished):

1. in Australia
2. overseas, but relating to Australia
3. by Australians working overseas
4. by foreign academics working in Australia.

'Criminology' is left undefined because of the amorphous nature of the subject matter and to allow for new developments in the discipline.

Work on the collection of citations has been in progress for nearly 1½ years and commenced with a methodical, cover-to-cover search of the major criminological journals in Australia. Citations within these journals to other relevant materials were noted for verification and further searching at a later date.

At present approximately 4,000 citations to journal articles, book reviews, editorials, letters and notes of a substantive nature make up the information base. A list of the major journal sources of Australian criminological information is published in vol.4, no.1 of the *Information Bulletin of Australian Criminology*.

Bibliographical details of monograph materials including books, government and research reports and theses are planned for inclusion in the data base in the near future, to be followed by newspaper article citations. Other sources of information planned for inclusion include case reports and commentaries, parliamentary debates and historical government reports.

Because the J.V. Barry Memorial Library was only established in 1973, its holdings are not always sufficient to allow it to provide a complete document back-up. Availability of journal articles can be sought through most libraries by the use of SALSSAH (Serials in Australian Libraries Social Sciences and Humanities), and SSAL (Scientific Serials in Australian Libraries).

The availability of holdings of criminological journals in Australia will be enhanced by the union list of serial holdings of Australia's criminological libraries at present being undertaken by the Monash University Law Library. A union list of monograph holdings of the same criminological libraries is being compiled by the J.V. Barry Memorial Library. The monograph citation retrieved from the CINCH data base will include the locations from the union list.

It is expected that the data base will grow at a rate of approximately 500 new citations per year, in addition to 'retrospective' citations discovered through historical searches.

Indexing Process

Material published since 1975 has been sighted by the indexers. Earlier material has mostly been indexed from title. A list of subject words used is being developed by the indexers. There are now more than 1,000 subject words being used in indexing. These words can be used both separately and in combination.

Search Requests

Requests for searches need not be limited to 'subject', as searches can also be made by reference to particular authors, journals, periods of time, citation categories or combinations of any of these.

Computer-based retrieval systems do not magically deliver answers at the push of a button, for the success or failure of such systems is less dependent on the machines involved than on the effort put in by the researchers, the indexers and, most importantly, by the person requesting the search. The computer in a retrieval system acts only as a high-speed matching device, matching the subject words given to the articles or monographs against the subject words which have been used in formulating requests. Retrieval only occurs when there has been a match.

It should be remembered that the majority of items in the data base will not be relevant to a particular search. The aim of a search will be to retrieve as many *relevant* items as possible, not simply as *many items* as possible. A very broadly based search may yield a great number of items, many of which will not be of value, while a specific search may retrieve relatively few citations most of which will be relevant. Thus, the aim of a computer-search is precision rather than quantity.

A copy of a CINCH Search Request Form is included in this Introduction. All search requests must be made on these forms which are available from the J.V. Barry Memorial Library. The forms have been designed to obtain as much information as possible relating to a request, to enable an appropriate, specific bibliography to be retrieved.

Effective Use of the System

To make the best possible use of the system a user must be prepared to exert some effort in making his exact needs known.

Section 1 of the Search Request Form requires a detailed statement of the subject of the search. Once again *specificity* is stressed and the user is asked to define terms which may have special meaning to him. Of great importance is an indication of what is *not* required, as this will help to narrow the search.

Section 2 provides check-off boxes which will help limit the search. The aim is to obtain the material that is relevant to the *user's* needs, not all the material which may be available.

Section 3 asks that citations known to be relevant are provided. These citations help clarify the user's specific interest.

Evaluation

CINCH is still in its early stages of development. As yet, the data base only includes journal citations. Consequently, the bibliographies retrieved will not be comprehensive of all Australian material.

It is important to the functioning of CINCH to receive an indication from users as to the relevance of the citations retrieved. This permits us to improve the system and provide users with searches more suited to their needs.

Charges

At this stage the service is provided free but financial circumstances may alter and it may become necessary to impose a charge to cover expenses.

Time

Subject to the volume of requests, the availability of staff and the postal service, it is expected that searches will be completed within two weeks.

In the course of discussions, members present also discussed the advisability of providing for majority verdicts by juries in criminal cases and it was felt that a majority verdict of 10 to 2 would be appropriate and desirable. Emphasis was generally laid on the importance of providing more information to the judges to assist them in the exercise of sentencing powers.
