# Introduction

The Australian Institute of Criminology has established a national clearinghouse of criminological information to act as a central agency for the collection, storage, exchange and dissemination of bibliographical data on Australian and Australian-related criminological material.

This information is stored on computer and forms the data base of CINCH (Computerised Information from National Criminological Holdings), the Institute's computerised bibliographic service which provides rapid and comprehensive retrospective searches.

The *Information Bulletin of Australian Criminology* is published quarterly and is an integral part of this system, publishing in its 'Recent Publications' and 'Current and Recently Completed Research' sections all the new material which continuously updates the CINCH data base. It also contains information regarding past and forthcoming seminars in Australia, bibliographical activities of the J.V. Barry Memorial Library and generally aims to encourage a greater interchange of information between all persons interested in Australian criminology.

The success of the Information Bulletin depends to a large degree on material contributed to it by its readers, and persons who would like a statement of their research to appear or wish to publicise conferences or seminars are invited to complete the appropriate forms supplied with each issue and return them to the address below.

A review of research into the effects of long-term imprisonment reveals a conflict between the subjective experiences of deterioration reported by prisoners and the lack of empirically demonstrated ill-effects emerging from scientific (primarily psychological) studies. It is argued that our present measurement tools are inadequate for the task of evaluating deteriorative effects and that decisions about the appropriateness of long-term imprisonment cannot be made on the basis of empirical research. Against a background of criminological theory the study includes a descriptive and comparative analysis of the scheme in this state. The effectiveness of Community Service is compared to the effectiveness of Probation, and Parole in Western Australia, and where possible it is compared to similar schemes elsewhere.

The main findings of the study appear to indicate that:

- . over fifty percent of the offenders placed on Community Service in this state do complete the ordered number of hours in the allotted time period;
- . offenders on Probation tend to re-offend less than those on Community Service who tend to re-offend just slightly less than those on Parole;
- . fewer recidivists on Community Service are dealt with for a subsequent Breach of the Order than are recidivists on Probation or Parole;
- . the age of the offender is associated with both his ability to complete the Community Service, and to remain recidivism free;
- . the characteristics of the offender on Community Service, and the general operation of the scheme in this state is very similar to those found in schemes elsewhere;
- . the Community Service scheme in Western Australia does make a worthwhile contribution to the treatment of selected offenders.

Interesting trends in the actions and choices of offenders are drawn, indicating a move from the more 'traditional' sites and types of robberies. Further, it is shown that the national increase in the crime can be traced to a single city -- Auckland.
